Welcome to the sharing the heart of the Matter podcast, where we spend time with authentic and creative people willing to share their stories.

I'm Wynne Leon and in this episode Vicki Atkinson and I are talking with author, podcaster, publisher and former radio producer Rick Kaempfer.

Rick has recently published the Loop files, an oral history of the most outrageous radio station ever, the celebration of a time when radio, rock'n'roll and comedy all came together. We talked about how Rick prepared to meet celebrities as a DJ and producer in the pre Internet era. He tells us about his regimen to subscribe to all the magazines he could and read 7 newspapers a day.

Rick, who claims he is fueled by eye rolls, tells us great stories from his book. Father knows nothing that pulled from his weekly column when he was a stay at home dad of three boys. We recorded this conversation right after opening day for Major League Baseball, which was a great segue to his book Every Cub Ever.

And we talk about his fiction and his work as a publisher, supporting authors and encouraging the full publishing life cycle, including promotion.

This is a great episode with an incredibly prolific author, supportive publisher, and powerful presence. We know you'll love it.

Well, good morning, Rick Kaempfer, how are you?

I'm well. How are you?

Good. Wynne and I are thrilled to talk to one of our favorite authors. We've been busy kind of catching up on all the good stuff that you've been doing, but the fact that you've got some time for us to record a podcast and fill us in on what you've been up to is is a real treat. So we're grateful for the time.

Well and and by way of introduction, when one of the things that we wanted to lead with as we talk to Rick is his latest book, which is called the Loop Files. And you know I'm in Chicago right here in the Chicago area too and.

Generationally, we're around the same age, and this is it's like a firestarter of a book about what we would identify as, like the golden days of radio in our youth. But you had the privilege of being in the middle of the mayhem, and then you wrote this amazing book.

That really as you describe as kind of an oral history about everything that was unfolding and and I think in one place in the book you talked about the station being similar to a lot of crazy high school kids with too much money, right? Yeah.

Yeah, yeah, that's that's the way they used to describe. It is high school with money because none of us really came from money, but suddenly we were working at the top radio station in Chicago and money was everywhere because the ratings were huge. Everybody in Chicago.

And the talent level was through the roof. Some of the best radio personalities in history worked there all at the same time. I described it as the.

And you know, you walk down the hall and you've got one Hall of Famer after another. And I was the producer of Steve Dowling Gary Meyer show, which is a a Hall of Fame show.

Was something exciting and it was like that for all of us there. And I was there for seven years. The book covers about 30 years of time that actually 20 years, really 20 years of time. That is like the heyday of that radio station.

So we'll have to ask you about that. But when I think I just stepped on you. Sorry.

Well, no. I just for us. Non Chicago and it it the loop sounds like, you know, just one of those legendary. Rock stations of the late 70s early 80s. Is that right? Do I have that?

It became also a talk station, but like a comedy talk station, which is something that has never really existed before or since. It was the only thing of its kind throughout the entire country.

And, you know, when I remember being a high school student and going to like one of the popular concert venues like Poplar Creek to see Jackson Browne and just I think for so many people that are of a certain age or generation, I I was unprepared. Even though I I know you. I was unprepared for how many memory lane moments we're going to be served up just by listening to the stories that people have to tell about being there.

But we all went, you know, had our, you know, black, you know, grungy before it was grungy, like, looped T-shirts. I had a loop bumper sticker on the back of my orange Pinto, right.

You know it, it ties into everyone and that's why I did it as an oral history because I thought the story was too hard for me to tell.

Because I just in one perspective and all the people that were there were, I know them all personally and they were all willing to participate in the book. So I called them all individually and did interviews with them. And I got their memories too and that, you know, brought up stuff that I hadn't heard before or things that I had.

Forgotten about and and then I did it. I put it in chronological form after those interviews and there were probably 100.

Plus interviews that I did, maybe even 200.

And you know mine is so marked up because they're great continuing threads, you know, and voices that come through at different times. But just the organization of it is it's unlike anything I've ever read.

And you know the last song they played was highway to Hell by ACDC before they switched.

Switched over so it just it was always irreverent and it was just such a big part of my life. I met my wife there, you know my my first son was born when I was working there. It was a big part of my life and I wanted to share it with everybody.

What do you mean you're not going to do that?

You know, right. I mean I subscribed to like 1000 magazines just to. So I had as much information as possible, I you know, read 7 newspapers a day. I I spent all my time gathering material that was like a 24 hour a day job.
